Dear Friends,

Ascension Day occurs 40 days after Easter and recalls the moment when Jesus returned to heaven after his resurrection. The disciples had been prepared for this moment and reassured that God's presence would remain with them in the presence of his energizing, renewing, love filled Spirit. Christians celebrate the outpouring of God's Spirit on the Day of Pentecost (Whitsun), which is also known as the 'birthday of the Church.'

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York encourage us through a prayer initiative, 'Thy Kingdom Come' between Ascension and Pentecost, to reflect, think and pray about our lives, the lives of others and the life of the world, in anticipation and expectation that the gift of God's Spirit will continue to be poured out upon us in blessing, healing, renewal and peace-to equip us in the call to love and serve one another.

As the first followers of Jesus were waiting in Jerusalem after Jesus' Ascension, they devoted themselves to prayer- seeking God's presence, praying for each other and for those in need. Prayer is how we communicate with God, using words, in silent reflection or by lighting a candle or a prayer request. They prayed that their friends, family and neighbours may come to know the new life of Jesus within their lives and experiences.

The followers of Jesus today are praying for you, that you may know God working within your life and that you may know his love, strength, peace and healing within every detail of your life, and that you may come to know and meet Jesus, opening your hearts to God's loving presence and possibilities.

As we pray during June, may we also remember with thanksgiving the surviving veterans who shared in the D Day Landings on 6<sup>th</sup> June 1944 who will be commemorating the 75 anniversary and those who gave their lives in the liberation of Europe.

**Mothers' Union meeting 7 May**

**School Social Worker and Counsellor Rachel Kaunhoven** has worked for 3 days per week in this confidential role at St Marys School in Chesterfield for the last 9 years, during which she has seen referrals rise from 20 per year to over 100 per year. She works in a team of four, specialising in the 11-14 yr-old age group. Her case-load is about 25 at any one time. Children are referred to her by staff, but she is also available to students at break or lunch-time on an *ad hoc* basis.

Rachel went on to outline the kinds of issue with which she can be asked to help. We were surprised and shocked by the gravity of some of these problems. We had all heard of illness, bullying or non-attendance, but she also mentioned crises due to family poverty or breakdown, bereavement, or even abandonment of a child. Mental welfare is often at stake, particularly severe anxiety. Many situations call for practical help as well as advice and support, or even advocacy on behalf of the family.

St Mary's provides funding to enable students to take full part in school activities who would otherwise be unable to join in. She gave a happy example of two 16-year-old girls who were enabled to choose dresses to wear to the School Prom. On the other hand, Rachel has learned how deeply such situations affect the lives of children and their families, and how the effects of stress particularly in children far outlast their immediate causes.

## HOLME GRANGE GARDEN OPEN ON 15 JUNE

The garden of Shirley Stubbs will be open this year on Saturday 15 June from 11.00am to 4.00pm when it will be summer at last. Many of you have already visited the garden and we are hoping you will be able to come again this year to see the changes, enjoy a walk around, and spend some time having tea and delicious cakes baked by the ladies of Bakewell church. There will also be a wide range of plants for sale at keen prices all of which have been raised from the garden.

For those of you who have not been to Holme Grange before it is in a lovely spot hidden behind high stone walls; a haven of peace and calm green space with the picturesque 17c Holme Hall in the background above along with cattle grazing in the nearby fields.

Your visit will be making an important contribution to several very worthwhile charities. ## A Word from St Anne's Over Haddon
