A Word from St Anne's

We have finally left winter behind and the glorious month of May is upon us. How appropriate that Easter falls when the world of Nature (at least in our part of the world!) is coming back to life. But how sad that, this year, we find ourselves also having to pray for the people of Ukraine in their struggle with Putin's Russia in a war worse than anything we have seen in Europe since the second world war. And how proud we can feel that Tony and Rachel have travelled to Krakow in Poland with aid for a charity based there helping Ukrainian refugees. I remember visiting this beautiful city and it seems strange to think that it is now a hub for refugees, except when you look at the map and realise how close it is to the Ukrainian border, and then again when you recall that not far to the west of the city lies the infamous death camps of Auschwitz-Birchenu. Evil exists in this world, and we have to confront it, both with resistance and with love.

At St Anne's we continue (albeit haltingly!) to press forward with plans to re-order our church to meet the challenges and opportunities of the future. Zena (our second churchwarden) and I visited the church of St Wilfrid's Barrow on Trent recently to see what they have achieved in a similar project that was completed only last year. It was fascinating and encouraging. Although St Wilfrid's is a very different kind of church to St Anne's, being Saxon in origin and a church of the Order of the Knights Hospitallers in the Middle Ages, their objectives were very similar, as were the measures they took. So it can be done!

We hope to hold an exhibition soon explaining our proposals. All are welcome to come along.

Joint PCC 9.4.22

On a bright, chilly morning in April a group from the PCCs in the benefice gathered in the village hall in Sheldon - a first - to explore the possibility of working a bit more closely together in the future.

Before we got down to business, we shared a meaningful, short Eucharist, underlining why we do any of this, our belief in the story of salvation through the death and resurrection of Jesus.

Then Jason Kennedy of the loud shirt, the diocesan missionary, (he did say it gave us something to look at) came to the front to lead the morning. He asked us to rediscover our purpose and gave the illustration of what we often feel like - we are rolling a huge boulder uphill. Perhaps if we could remove an obstacle it would allow the boulder to roll downhill.

A quote from Mother Theresa: I am not called to be successful, but to be faithful.

We looked at six types of church and were asked to say which type we thought fitted our particular church. They all had their strengths and weaknesses. Jason was most struck by Sheldon having the pub landlady on their team (I think Canon Tony quite likes that too!)

Our strength was building bridges with the community. But we were unwilling to talk about our faith with each other. One easy step to respond could be to invest in more lay-led services.

One, if not two, cheers for the **electric organ** at last being repaired. You will have noticed that it is now used regularly, as the pipe organ was emitting blood-curdling noises. The decision has been taken not to spend more money on small repairs to the pipe organ, until it can be restored properly.

We approved **the accounts**, which Joyce Glencross had prepared, to be presented at the APCM on Sunday 15th May at 12.15pm.

We agreed very readily that Pat Bryant should be licensed as a **Reader** for another year.

There were various updates on **the Organ Appeal**. Dot Bushen, Joyce Glencross, Jeff Marsh and Mark Ramsden are all working on grant applications, which is a slow and frustrating business, but they are making headway; and other donations are coming in. We have unfortunately had to cancel the King's Men concert in July, because they have not confirmed the booking. So if anyone has ideas for a fundraiser, do come forward.
