Easy Eco Tip:

Green your home this Autumn. Tackle climate change and reduce your heating bill by testing how draughty or leaky your home is. Now is also a very good time to prepare for winter by sticking tinfoil or radiator panels between the wall and radiator, as these will help reflect heat back into your room during the colder months. And don't forget to get your boiler serviced!

A Word from St Anne's

We begin November with the Feast of All Saints Day, followed ' by the All Souls Day and preceded by All Hallows' E'en, collectively known (formerly) as "the Festival of Hallow Tide." Now, of course, this is mainly seen, in our secular society, as "Halloween," enjoyed, especially by children, for the scary thrills of ghosts and ghouls, skeletons and witches, cobwebs and spiders!

Some in the Church may disapprove of the recent growth in popularity of the "Halloween cult" but there can be no denying that many people, and not just children, enjoy the thrill of the scary! And of course it can be argued, with some justification, that the Church Festival subsumed the older, pre-Christian festival (the Celtic "Samhain" in Britain) that occurred at this time of the year to mark the end of harvest-time when there was also a need to propitiate the spirits of the departed. It may be that, despite the tackiness of its commercialised version, Halloween does represent a yearning to engage with the "spirit world" which is largely denied or disparaged by the rational scientific world view?

Less than a fortnight later in this month - on the 12th of November this year - we will have another ceremony to commemorate the souls of the departed. This is the Service of Remembrance for those who died in war, especially during the two world wars of the twentieth century. In the little village of Over Haddon the war memorial on Main Street contains the names of five men from the village who died during the first world war. This seems a shockingly large number from such a small population and would have been traumatic for the community but it was not by any means unusual. Rather surprisingly perhaps, but also hearteningly, the numbers attending the short ceremony to commemorate those who died in wars at 10.45 at the Over Haddon war memorial, have remained quite high, at around fifty, over the past few years. We still remember them.

Bird's Eye View for November 2023

(A report from the October PCC.)



At the October PCC one of the most knotty problems we had to grapple with was the news that Joyce Glencross, our long-standing **Administrator**, would like to stand down fairly soon. She is still happy to continue as our Treasurer. We have come to rely on her promptness in responding to producing duty rotas, sending out notices to the congregation about upcoming events, and much else.

We need to look at whether it is possible to carve out a space for a **parish/ benefice office**, at the church or in town. We would love to hear from someone who is itching to administrate. Or do we need to advertise for a part-time job?

The fabric committee will explore further the installation of **glass doors** at the south entrance. We think that the present wooden inner door is a barrier to visitors. And at the same time consideration could be given to installing a small lift for wheel-chair users, but funds may not run to that yet.

One of our MAP priorities is to identify **ministry opportunities for older people in the parish**. We plan to have a coffee morning for representatives of groups to share existing work and identify potential needs, such as a Dementia Café for instance.

Another priority is to **treasure the environment**. The recent Bronze Eco Award for All Saints will become a springboard for looking at the Silver requirements, together with the possibility of applying for National Church funding to help All Saints look at the **Net Zero by 2030** agenda. The Benefice Churches are all creating their MAPs and these will be shared together to see where there is overlap or potential sharing and resourcing together.

Trees, health and safety, new safe, organ repair, and safeguarding issues are all going swimmingly.
