Thus it is that the awful events we are witnessing in the Holy Land in 2023 display a tragic similarity to those of the first century AD and it is surely something we should meditate upon this Advent season as we prepare for the sublime Festival of Christmas.

A Word from St. Anne's

The latest thing to happen at St Anne's church in Over Haddon is that we have been very generously donated an organ – a very versatile and handsome Lowrey – by Lynne Mycock, a resident of the village, which will undoubtedly enhance all musical events at our church. We are especially looking forward to its being played at the Carol Service at 6pm on Sunday the $17^{\rm th}$ of December.

So as we prepare for the Carol Service, and for the four weeks of Advent leading up to it, our thoughts turn to the momentous events that took place in the Holy Land over 2,000 years ago, but which inevitably makes us think too of the dreadful things that are happening in that same region at the present time.

Two thousand and twenty three years ago the small Jewish colony of the Roman Empire, occupying part of the hilly area of the Levant coastal strip next to the Eastern Mediterranean was simmering with resentment because of its subjugation under Roman rule and the imposition of a puppet king (Herod). Many Jews were secretly preparing for an armed uprising to free themselves and were hoping for the emergence of a "Messiah" to lead them. Meanwhile the Roman administration was organising a census of the population of their dominions which required the heads of households to journey to their ancestral locality to be enumerated. Thus, as we know, Joseph and Mary journeyed to Bethlehem where Mary gave birth to Jesus - a Messiah, not the kind which the Jewish resistance hoped for, but one of infinitely greater significance and hope for Mankind.

Some Jews - and many more Gentiles - accepted Jesus, the new Messiah, and Christianity spread to become the dominant religion of the West. However, hard-core nationalist Jews did rise up - several times - against the Roman yoke, but were defeated and eventually expelled, resulting in a great diaspora of Jewish people all over the Near East, North Africa and Europe. Their ancestral land of Israel remained under Roman rule, to be followed by Byzantine, Arab and Turkish rule, until 100 years ago when it became part of a British mandated territory called Palestine.

Subsequently some Jews, inspired by a "Zionist" movement, predominantly amongst descendants of the diaspora in Europe and North America, migrated to Palestine and settled in what they thought of as their ancestral homeland. Their relationship with the existed inhabitants – predominantly Arab and Muslim – was generally peaceful, although sometimes uneasy, and it was only after the second world war, when a flood of Jewish migrants – largely survivors of the Holocaust in Europe – arrived that serious conflict arose. The state of Israel as we know it was formed out of violent conflict, which resulted the expulsion of many of the Arab inhabitants of Palestine and the continued subjugation of many more within the territories of the West Bank and Gaza.

Morning Praise

For our Advent service we are focussing on preparation rather than tinsel..

To that end we shall invite you to prepare the crib for the Christchild as we did last year with Cloth for the Cradle - strips of cloth provided - and Judith is going to give the talk which should prove very interesting. She says:-

In the congregation-led service on December 10th, I am going to be talking about folk carols, especially those from Derbyshire; how and when they were collected; where the tunes came from and the ones we still hear today. Bring your singing voice with you! Judith Taylor

Organ Restoration Fund

We have received £3,250 from Benefact Trust and wait replies from the other Grant applications, they have not been rejected outright so we are hoping to receive some funding from them.

The Lunchtime talks this year have raised £1,685 with expenses of just £87.for 7 lunches of anything between 15 & 40 people, very many thanks to the catering team, to the speakers and to all who have helped in any way to raise £1,600.

The last coffee concerts of the year is Bel Canto on 9th December The Cantiamo concert was well supported raising almost £500.

Fiori Musicali, with His Majesty's Sagbutts & Cornets concert last Saturday is expected have raised £600-£650 when figures are finalised.

The Book stall, organ pipe and 100 club, continue to provide a regular income.

The repair to the organ will start in February and the first instalment of scheduled payment is due before Christmas. The total cost of the complete job: repair, electrical work, scaffolding, consultancy fees and worker's lodgings is expected to be £171,000, currently we are still £35,000 short.
