A Word from St Anne's

"Give us this day our daily bread." The Harvest has been an important theme of Christian teaching down the ages. Jesus even celebrated it in the most important prayer He gave us. So on Sunday the 22nd of September we celebrated our Harvest Festival at St Anne's church Over Haddon.

The church was decorated, with flowers and foliage, in the rich colours of early Autumn, and these will remain in place until they need removal/replacement and the gifts of non-perishable foodstuffs are packed up and sent to the High Peak Food Bank.

Undeniably the Festival is "not what it was" back in the day (which us oldies remember) when a large proportion of the village and congregation were directly involved in farming and to whom harvest really meant something. Nowadays, of course, to most of us (even in Over Haddon) food is something we buy at the supermarkets, who source it from around the world, at the lowest prices possible....

An interesting discussion arose from this, posing ethical questions and dilemmas which are highly pertinent to Christian thought. Should we buy our food from farms where animal cruelty exists, or where farm workers and small farmers are being exploited, or where crops are grown on land cleared from ecologically rich rain forests?....Should we demand that our own farmers use less chemical fertilisers and toxins which are so damaging to wildlife, soil and water quality?...

The logic of such an ethically sustainable agriculture, of course, is that even if it is better for the environment and healthier for us, food would become more expensive. Even allowing for the fact that food, in real terms, is cheaper today than it has ever been historically, this would cause real problems for people on lower incomes. Indeed, the fact that we are also collecting for the Food Bank brings this into stark relief.

This does not invalidate our conclusions about sustainable farming however. Instead we should be demanding a more equal society where everyone can afford good food to eat. At the moment, in 21st century Britain, we seem content to accept both degrading poverty and obscene wealth...

Are these radical thoughts? Well, we are supposed to be looking for major political changes...!

Aren't we?
