Book Review Who Moved the Stone? by Frank Morison

Joyce, our Treasurer, came to present the accounts for the year 2024, having, I'm sure, not slept since New Year's Eve to get them ready in time. As expected, our expenditure exceeded our income last year by around £2000. You will remember Mr Micawber "Annual income twenty pounds; annual expenditure nineteen pounds nineteen and sixpence, result happiness. Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure twenty pound and sixpence, result misery." This does not include the organ which had its own separate fund. This enabled us also to look in greater depth at this year's budget. We discussed, for example, whether we really need to spend £1800 a year on candles, lovely as they are. A more major concern is the £11,000 we are spending to heat the church. We really need some expert advice on thermostatic controls.

As well as trying to reduce our expenditure where we can, we really need to look at ways to increase our income, whether through donations from visitors, congregational giving or external letting. Let us know if you have any ideas!

In other news: the Royal British Legion would like to reinstate the flagpole that used to be opposite the Newark Steps. What do you think? Is it a good idea?

Christmas Tree Festival

A huge "thank you" to everyone who helped to make this year's Christmas Tree Festival so special and so successful.

There were 59 trees in church, decorated by local businesses, organisations, charities and schools and 7 church trees. The church looked magical.

We had a record number of visitors, most of whom were very impressed by the quality and the originality of the trees and of the appearance of the church in general. Many positive comments were received.

So many people lent a hand - in preparation; moving trees; welcoming visitors; counting money; making tea; making cakes, biscuits, mince pies, soup; working in the kitchen; and in the aftermath - removing trees; clearing up pine needles and returning the church to its normal clean and tidy state.

You all did a remarkable job. Without you, the festival could not go ahead and we are sincerely grateful to you all. Thank you.

The church budget is not looking very healthy for the year ahead and a deficit is anticipated. It is therefore, very gratifying that the festival made just over £4,500, inclusive of repaid tax, for church repairs.
