



Dear Friends

Holy Week that begins on Palm Sunday leads on a journey towards Easter that contains so many powerful and emotional experiences as we sit and eat with Our Lord at the Last Supper; watch everything that is familiar to us in church stripped away; encounter betrayal and abandonment, suffering and death; and the heart breaking moment when Mary holds her bloodied son in her arms before his hurried burial. We need to experience this, however hard it is to do so, in order to really experience the Easter transformation from darkness to light, death to life, despair to hope, sadness to joy, and fear to courage.

As I write this we are trying to work out the incredible transformation from determined support and backing for Ukraine in her fight against oppression and occupation from a Nation, with her allies, who have together policed the world seeking to avoid global and continental conflict since 1945, to what feels abandonment of Ukraine's future Sovereignty in a drive to turn peace into something at any price, as long as it makes America great again.

Together with the need to find a pathway to a long term secure home for Palestinian's and the security of peace for Israel, we wonder how the powerful message of Easter can and will give hope and life to those who live with conflict, uncertainty, pain, loss, despair and fear.

The Christian Faith is treated with great suspicion and dismissed as being irrelevant today. We have the responsibility of sharing our experience of a living and loving God who transforms our lives, giving them meaning and hope through the life that Jesus gives and offers. However difficult and worrying the world, or our life may be, Easter speaks to us of hope, because we know that God is there before us, in Jesus Christ, our loving, protecting, and guiding shepherd. Our faith is in Christ the peacemaker and reconciler, and our prayer is that he will strengthen us in our faith, and guide us as to how we can be a witness to the light, love, peace, healing and reconciliation that Jesus has revealed to us, and we are called to share in a broken, divided and wounded world, in need of healing and peace with justice, compassion and love.



Peak Wesley Way Pilgrimages seem to be gaining in popularity, whether it's walking the Camino de Santiago or walking from Ilam to Eyam and getting your card stamped in All Saints on the way. The Methodists have come up with an imaginative way of using their chapels, which are having to close as congregations dwindle. They have designed a route from Matlock, through Youlgrave, Great Longstone, Baslow, Hathersage and Castleton, ending in Edale. I went to an open afternoon in Great Longstone and saw the chapel, furnished with six camp beds, with pillow and blanket, a shower and toilet and small kitchen. Two to six people can book in and someone is paid to clean the place and provide cereals and milk and fruit. They hope visitors will shop locally and frequent the pub (at a discount!) and travel by train to deter cars from blocking the Peak District. They hope it will bring life into the area. It got off to a good start last year, and already they've had a booking from as far away as Fife in Scotland. It's still early days, so they think things will evolve gradually. It must have involved a lot of hard work and I take my hat off to them. It is a Good Thing

- Description of the parish, to include census information, amenities, tourist and leisure attractions, links with overseas towns, unique features, specific social problems and opportunities, future planned developments, types of businesses etc, maps
- Schools and Education, to include past involvement and visions for the future
- Health care, to include pastoral care in the community
- Other churches and our relationship with them eg Bakewell Churches
 Together
- Our church community, to include links with the wider community eg Carnival, Christmas Tree Festival, Well dressing

- Our church, to include the history, the state of repair, current and possible future use of the building.
- Our groups and links with the wider community
- Our worship, to include the pattern of services, styles of service and music
- Our vision and mission. How do we marry up with the benefice and diocese?
- Our new vicar, to include what we are looking for in a new incumbent, areas of continuity and challenge, any wishes for the future
- Photographs of a positive and happy congregation!
